Analysis of a Novel form

A. The Setting

- * What, briefly, is the main plot? Trace its development, climax and solution?
- * Are there any subsidiary plots? Describe them.
- * Did you notice any coincidences or surprising turns of events?
- * How important is the plot to the work as a whole?

C. The Characters

- * Who are the main characters (her and heroine)? Describe their physical appearance, social position and character, as revealed by what they say and do, and by what others say about them.
- * Who are the most important subsidiary characters? Describe them.
- * Is there any development or change of character in the book?
- * Is the characterization credible? Is it subtle or in black and white?

D. The Themes

Are any of the following themes introduced?

Human relationship - love, hate, fear, jealousy...

Social problems; political problems; religious problems;

The Arts; science. Describe the way any of these are presented.

Is there any philosophical message to be read from the work?

E. The Form

- * Is the story presented directly by the writer in the first person, or indirectly (God's view)? Whateffect does this have?
- * What use is made of the following literary forms: dialogue, narrative, letters, poetry, natural description, personal description?
- * Analyze the sentence structure. Are the sentences simple or complex; short or long?
- * Analyze the vocabulary. Is it simple or difficult; colloquial or literary?
- * Is the writing humorous? What kind of humour is it verbal, situation, slapstick?
- * Is there irony or wit?
- * Would you say the writer's treatment of his subject was: realistic, romantic, ironic, tragic, surrealistic?
